There has been a lot going on throughout the state and with the Association on behalf of the chapters and the membership. Much of this is covered in more detail in an "email blast" from our Executive Director, Paul Cathcart. Begin preparing for the 2010 celebration of the Associations 50th Anniversary.

Due to the significance of this celebration, heightened focus will be initiated to examine unique and economically feasible events during 2010 that would generate net revenue equal to or exceeding 2009 banquet results. Some of the initial efforts will be directed to visiting venues and developing celebration strategies for recommendation to a Board sub-committee. If you are interested in being a member of this sub-committee or want t o offer suggestions on venues and/or types of celebration events, please do not hesitate to email me at pcathcart@anws.org.

Assist Association Chapters in seeking grant funding for specific Chapter projects.

Since many Association Chapters lack grant writing experience, Association staff will assist in identifying Foundations with funding priorities consistent with the proposed Chapter project and then the ED will draft the grant proposals based on input received from chapters needing the funds for the specific purpose.

Develop new website homepage

There is a dire need to upgrade the ANWS homepage to reflect the professionalism of the organization to attract visitors such as donor and member prospects. Also, the ability to have real time editing by staff will allow for up to date events and action alerts to be posted.

Membership Drive Incentive Awards

The 2009/2010 Membership Drive Incentive Program continues with the first of the quarterly drawings recently taking place on May 9th at the Spring Board meeting.

Jim Robinson was the overall winner with 25 new members recruited and therefore 25 chances out of 38 total chances in the drawing. Additional membership drive incentive awards were also presented to Allan Gabe, Art Israelson, Chris Kauffman, Greg Harlow, Jim Robinson, Jim Neal, Ken DeMacon, Mary Attaway, Mike D. Smith, and William Holsclaw.

Valuable prizes will be awarded to members who help the Association achieve the goal of increasing our membership by 50 percent via the recruiting of 750 new members by February 2010. Incentive prizes that will be awarded include guided fishing trips, art prints, rods, reels, tackle and other fishing gear generously donated to help our organization grow.

Status of Proposed State Legislation- Association State Legislative Advocate Bob Oleson offers his latest assessment of the key bills he has been tracking for our membership:

SAFE for Salmon (HB 2579) Due to the lack of political consensus on SAFE, this is the alternative effort to form a task force who will supposedly address lower Columbia salmon allocation issues. The SAFE Coalition continues to massage the bill to the benefit of sports fishing.

June 2009 Status of Proposed State Legislation (continued)

ODFW Budget (HB 5014 and HB 2223) ODFW is underfunded yet the proposed budget contemplates a 30 percent across the board cut for all State agencies. The Association will continue to monitor an increase in fees to insure that it is balanced and benefits directed more to sport fishing.

SB 571, a bill that increases the penalty for any intentional release of non-native fish into any of Oregon's bodies of water without a permit, has passed both the House and Senate Floors. If signed by the Governor, the penalty would increase to a maximum fine of \$125,000, maximum imprisonment of five years, or both. A few years ago, the state spent more than \$5 million to eradicate an invasive fish species from Diamond Lake in Southern Oregon. This bill passed the House Floor unanimously this week, and is on its way to the Governor's desk.

Invasive Species (HB 2220) Establishes sighting inspections along the States border and grants additional actions to police and ODFW staff. However, no funding is proposed to insure that invasive species will be stopped.

Preserve Oregon's Legacy (HB 3013) This is the Marine Reserves bill which the Association continues to oppose if it is amended to include more areas without first establishing the goals of each new area or reduce restrictions based on success or failure of imposed restrictions.

Oasis Bill (HB 2406) We continue to oppose this bill since it proposes to take significant water supplies from the Columbia River at a time when migrating salmon need it most.

Gus Kriara, age 84, passed away peacefully on April 9, 2009. Born Dec. 15, 1924, to Greek immigrant parents Harriet and John Kriara in Portland, Gus attended Jefferson High School and Oregon State University for a short time before he joined the Navy



during the height of World War II. Stationed in the Pacific theatre, Gus served on the aircraft carrier USS Antietam until the war's end. He was drafted back into the Navy at the start of the Korean War after which he returned to Portland. He worked for the Karamanos family at Sunshine Dairy as a milkman and later as sales manager. Gus worked for Sunshine Dairy more than 20 years, going on to start his own food import and distribution company, Far West Food Associates.

Gus is survived by his wife, Sophia; sister, Dianna George; his daughters and sons-inlaw, Katherine and Marvin Peterson and JoAnne and Kent Grewe; and seven grandchildren, Nicole, Matthew, Gregory, Madeline, Diane, Alison and Michael. Gus was a lifelong member of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Cathedral where he once held the position of parish council president. He was affiliated with the American Hellenic Educational Progressive As-

sociation (AHEPA), the Chefs de Cuisine Society, the American Hellenic Education Center (AHEC), a member of the Sandy River Chapter of Northwest Steelheaders and was a lifetime member of Riverside Country Club.

Gus' true life's work was the founding and stewardship of an outdoor camp and retreat center on the Sandy River, Camp Angelos (campangelos.org). Gus contributed his vision, leadership and more than 60,000 hours of volunteer time to the camp. He and his AHEC board have created a place that has and will continue to touch the lives of thousands of people for years to come. The camp has been used by Outdoor School, Easter Seals, Kids 'n Cancer Camp Agape, and the Camp Angelos Fish Camp, as well as by the Greek community at large. Last summer, the camp's lodge was named the Gus Kriara -Kalamata Lodge. Members of the Sandy River Chapter were instrumental in his famous "Fishing Camps for Kids", first helping to construct a fishing dock for kids over a pond, and later installing a fountain that irrigated the pond. They also staffed the kids fishing camps each summer, and helped with other camp projects.

Gus was a decorated veteran, received the AHEPA Plato award and was awarded the Medal of St. Paul, the highest honor bestowed upon a layman by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America for his tireless service and numerous accomplishments. Gus' vision, independent spirit and grandfatherly presence will be missed by many, many people. In lieu of flowers, the family requests that remembrances be made to Camp Angelos Retreat and Conference Center, 32149 S.E. Stevens Road, Corbett, OR 97019.

Salish Pond Event a Success

Most of all it was gratifying to observe the children and parents catching their first fish in a safe and clean environment. Gus Kriara and the end of an era

It is with deep regret that we report of the passing of fellow member Gus Kriara known by many of us as 'Gus' with his Greek camp (Camp Angelos) on the Sandy River. To those who are more recent members Gus with the little older guy, with the scratchy voice, who came to chapter meetings soliciting volunteers for his fishing programs. He was a most unique guy who was totally dedicated to his camp and to his kids. He had a charm and style that made it impossible to tell him no. He can always be copied or imitated but there will never be another Gus and he will be terribly missed.

I first came in contact with Gus when I was part of the Steelheaders that built the fishing dock. The frame had been built over the water but it was a rainy day when the deck and rails were installed. Larry Palmer was instrumental in getting volunteers from several chapters to work on the project. Chapter member Nick Galash, the senior, was deeply involved in coordinating many Sandy Chapter volunteers and I worked with Nick installing much of the cable wire around the rearing pond and the fishing pond. Money was obtained from the parents of one of the cancer camp kids for a statue which is mounted in the middle of the fishing pond. Our late Bill Cluney was in the pump business and was deeply involved in the pump for the fountain. Nick Galash, the junior, and his side kick Andy Franklin, both of DP Construction were involved in the construction of the nurses' quarters. These were all projects Gus was promoting volunteers, supplies and money. Many Sandy River chapter members were involved in much of the construction work, except for the nurse's station, and they were all there because of Gus.

When Nick, senior, retired I had the pleasure and chore of coordinating the volunteers for the Kids with Cancer Camp, there were two of these, the Fish Camp which was a week long, and the Greek Camp for the Greek Community which owned the property. There were great volunteers for these camps and one of the outstanding people was Howard Berg who is currently now the chapter's camp fishing coordinator. All the great folks that came out and volunteered were because of the great organization skills, dedication to his camp, and the appreciation he always expressed make Gus Kriara one of the most likeable and loved people I have ever known.

Clearer water means think smaller sized lures and a bit lighter leaders than for winter fishing. Try smaller Corkies and a drop of shrimp oil on a small tuft of yarn for drift fishing. My best colors....pink and white, peach and white, and light green and white. Naturally, sometimes they want the brightest pink or flame orange one you have ! Still, think small size-wise.

If you haven't tried a lot of jig fishing, now is the time to start! I have included a pix of a pretty jig and the basic book above...get 'em and get fishing!
