#### First Bite Jigs special offer




#### Sockeye Season opens

CLACKAMAS, Ore. -- Chinook anglers on the Columbia River will have an unexpected opportunity to take home a sockeye salmon when the summer chinook fishing season opens on Saturday.

Due to much higher than average counts of sockeye salmon passing Bonneville Dam, Oregon and Washington fishery managers decided today to allow retention of sockeye salmon during upcoming summer chinook fisheries.


From the Rocky Point/Tongue Point line upstream to Bonneville Dam the river will be open to the retention of sockeye from 12:01 a.m. Saturday, June 21 through Saturday, June 28. From Bonneville Dam upstream to Priest Rapids Dam the season extends from 12:01 a.m. Saturday, June 21 through Thursday, July 31, 2008.

All sockeye are considered adults, regardless of size, and are included in the daily bag limit of two adult salmon or steelhead.

#### Sandy River Recreation Report

Last updated 6/17 -- Spring chinook and summer steelhead fishing on the Sandy are good. Water levels and clarity are ideal and water temperatures are finally hovering around the 50 degree mark.

Fishing for summer steelhead near the hatchery remains very good with many anglers catching their limits.

As on the Clackamas, anglers are advised that this fishery could be good well into the summer as a result of the cool spring conditions.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission adopted new sport-fishing regulations for the Sandy River which move the fishing deadline (or boundary) upstream to the mouth of the Salmon River (near Brightwood) began Jan. 1, 2008. There are recent reports as of early April of wild fish being caught and released in the newly opened section of river above Marmot Dam. There are few hatchery winter and summer steel-head available above Cedar Creek which can be retained if caught, but there is some opportunity for catch and release of wild fish for those interested in a more remote angling experience. Once again, be aware that winter steelhead may be spawning in the newly opened reach above the former Marmot Dam. The new area should provide good opportunity for hatchery spring that stray past Cedar Creek starting in May and running through early July. All current fishing regulations in the lower river apply to the newly extended area.

#### Ocean Temperatures High

New research suggests that ocean temperature and associated sea level increases between 1961 and 2003 were 50 percent larger than estimated in the 2007 Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report.

The results are reported in the June 19 edition of the journal Nature.

An international team of researchers, including Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory climate scientist Peter Gleckler, compared climate models with improved observations that show sea levels rose by 1.5 millimeters per year in the period from 1961-2003. That equates to an approximately  $2^{1/2}$ -inch increase in ocean levels in a 42-year span.

The research corrected for small but systematic biases recently discovered in the global ocean observing system, and uses statistical techniques that "infill" information in data-sparse regions. The results increase scientists' confidence in ocean observations and further demonstrate that climate models simulate ocean temperature variability more realistically than previously thought.

"This is important for the climate modeling community because it demonstrates that the climate models used for assessing sea-level rise and ocean warming tie in closely with the observed results," Gleckler said.

#### STEP Projects Volunteers and Items Needed

I have accepted the position of STEP Coordinator (stream work and related projects for fish...) for this chapter. It is a position I have held before, although for another chapter. We were very successful increasing the numbers of spawning salmon and steelhead in streams near Tillamook at very low cost, in concert with our ODFW STEP biologist.

We did surveys of the streams to determine the best actions to take in the future, developed plans, gathered tools and materials and got to work. We can do the same thing here.

I found that everyone can play a role, and it is surprising what helps to make a project really "GO".

One of our members was unable physically to get into the streambed and do much rock moving, but was a heck of a good cook. We purchased camp style cooking gear, and following every project were treated to a nice lunch. I am certain participation in the projects increased as a result. Another member, a CPA by trade, kept careful track of all expenses, filed paperwork and greatly helped keep things organized. I'll find something that suits anyone who wants to help.

#### **STEP Update**

On June 22nd, Sandy river chapter members met Russ Plaeger, from the Sandy River Watershed Council (SRWC) to do some work in a valuable side channel on the Salmon river, a tributary of the Sandy.

This side channel is where the main old course of the Salmon River once ran...until the big flood of 1964. (Undoubtedly one of those "500 year" floods we seem to get every few years!!). The Salmon River decided to move over a ways, leaving this nice bunch of gravel, but with little water.

A couple years ago local landowners, in concert with the SRWC decided to divert some Salmon River water back into the old channel, making a good spawning and rearing habitat for salmon and steelhead. A small wing dam was built, and water went into the old channel so far so good. But some invasive grass - "Reed Grass" — moved in and was threatening to muscle out the tree plantings made in the river to provide soil stability and shade for the stream.

Chapter members, Howard Berg, Mike Myrick, Art Israelson, Howard Anderson, and myself, joined ten members of the local homeowners group and SRWC members to hack down the invading grasses. This was flowed up by an excellent stir-fry lunch prepared by "Wok master" Art Israelson. I must mention the free propane donated by chapter member Erik K., without which our stir-fry would not have fried at all.

So next time you want to avoid some housework, get in some good scenery, and do something good for the river and get a free stir fry lunch to boot...look up the next STEP project!




