## Youtube Event with Randy Newberg

Northwest Steelheaders co-hosted a LIVE YouTube discussion and Q&A with Randy Newberg on **June 25th**, **at 5pm PST**. If you missed it you can still view **Randy Newbergs** recently released cutting-edge film, **The Dam That Never Was**, which is a story of redemption and conservation on the Yellowstone River, the longest free-flowing river in the lower 48 states. The Yellowstone is a 700 mile tributary of the Missouri river. The Missouri being one of the most dammed and controlled rivers in the American West. Thanks to the efforts of Jim Posewitz and other key advocates who helped prevent the Allenspur dam project on the Yellowstone, the Missouri River has been able to maintain its flow regime and thriving ecosystem.

The Snake River is the largest tributary of the Columbia River and has historically accounted for 50% of its salmon and steelhead (approximately 16 million fish per year).



## **One Last Cast**

With time on my hands I have taken the opportunity to read some of the Frank Amato Publications classics such as *The Steelhead Trout* by Trey Combs (1971) and *Western Steelhead Fishing Guide* by Milt Keizer (1988). Others that could be added to this list that I have read previously are *Steelhead Drift Fishing* by Bill Luch (1976) and *Steelhead Fly Fishing and Flies* by Trey Combs (1976). Still to read is *River Salmon Fishing* by Bill Stinson (1986). All of these books were written back in the day when I was first learning to fish for salmon and steelhead – a sobering thought as this dates back 30 to 50 years ago.

One of the things I appreciate about these books is their discussion of the origins and heritage of steelhead and salmon fishing in the Pacific Northwest. Early pioneers in the sport were primarily fly fishers and most became icons including famous authors Zane Grey and Roderick Haig-Brown. Haig-Brown is worth googling because many of his books are all about fishing and would provide ample reading material for the next pandemic. Not to say there were pioneer gear fishers; they just didn't get



the attention and notoriety of the fly fishers. The fly fishers documented their efforts in the magazines at the time such as Forest and Stream and Field and



Stream. Field and Stream sponsored an annual fishing contest which was won many a year by northwest steelhead fly fishers and put many a river and fisher on the map.

Contemporary steelheading as we know it today took off in the 1970's and 1980's and as I mentioned previously I was part of this expansion. Hatchery programs exploded and some rivers became crowded with fishers. What I find interesting in these books is that the authors also

prognosticated about the "future of steelheading". Some of the authors questioned the hatchery practices of the day and there was consensus amongst all about the importance of releasing wild steelhead even where take was allowed. Fin clipping was just emerging and I remember of the


diagrams educating anglers on how to recognize hatchery fish by their deformities in their fins – especially the dorsal fin.

It struck me that we today are living in the "future of steelheading" and that many of the policy choices discussed in the 1970's and 1980's regarding hatcheries and wild fish have matured and been implemented while others – such as the importance of habitat and water quality (i.e., temperature) -- are still being discussed. I tip my hat to these authors because their thoughts written in the 1970's and 1980's about the "future of steelheading" have held true – giving us the opportunity to fish for these magnificent fish today in their future.

John Hydorn w/Cameron Black Steelhead on the Columbia River








If you would like to run for any of these position all you need to do is contact any current officer or member of the Election Committee. To run for an office you must be a current member in good standing.
