The Few, the Proud, the Successful at the Annual John Day River Pool Campout

The Chapter's second annual boating, camping fish-a-long on the John Day Arm of the John Day Pool formed by the John Day Dam on the Columbia River was a big success for the few that could justify stealing the time away over the Father's Day weekend. Participating in the event (and home in time for Father's Day) were Allan Kraxberger and Stephen Thomson as hosted by Steve Childress' and his boat. John Wheeler provided the second boat for the event and hosted Jim Cathcart through the weekend.



We stayed at Philippi Park, a US Army Corps of Engineers facility maintained and operated by the <u>Opal Foundation</u>. What an excellent facility – flush toilets, showers, lush irrigated grass, plenty of shade, picnic tables and top notch boat docks. If you never have been there before, the first question that comes to mind is what are all those three legged metal mini-tables for? (Hint: Did I mention the grass was irrigated).

Fishing for warm water species was excellent. Steve and company dialed into picking off smallmouth bass ranging from "weenie" size (8-10"), to aerobatic hotdogs (10-12") to full fledge pound sausages (12" and up)! The trick was twitching Mr. Twister type lead head grubs in every color imaginable as long as

it was chartreuse! the big surprise of the trip was John and Jim dialing into the walleye fishing. While salmon and steelhead have been taking a few hits from the droughts of the past few years, apparently, the walleye have been winning and spreading their range as a result of these conditions. Not known to previously be in the John Day Arm in significant numbers, Jim and John fished below The Narrows with walking sinkers and night crawler spinner harnesses and cleaned-up. A couple of fish over 20" were taken, some in the 18-20" range and a slug in the 13-16" range. Filleted and skinned, these fish make excellent camp and home table fare. Also caught were pumpkinseeds, bluegills, smallmouths (including a 15 incher) and juvenile channel catfish.

The weather was splendid with powder blue skies and mostly manageable wind.

I have it on good authority that the organizers are going to stay clear of the Father Day's weekend next year. So, keep your other June 2018 weekends free for next year's event.

What's the point?

Anglers are a funny sort. We get all excited about gear, boats and related stuff, spend a lot of money traveling around to fish and then sometimes ignore the most basic things that negate all of our other efforts.

Really when you get down to it you have to admit that there's not much more elemental in fishing than a well tied knot and a good sharp hook. I went fishing one day years ago with someone who had spent about \$60,000 on a boat and another \$50,000 dollars on a truck to tow it, and somehow had not figured out the good knot and sharp hook thing....but that is another (sad) story for later. Let's get after that hook point here...

Modern hooks are generally of good quality. A couple ultra premium brands are even sharp enough to use right out of the package. Here's the deal though, most hooks are not sharp enough when new, and they all get dull in use. Some methods, like drift fishing, place the hooks in close contact with rocky river bottoms. Rocks are hard on hook points. So you have to be able to sharpen the hook points. Check your hook every five casts!

Basically you have three easy tools available to sharpen your hooks- hook files, hook stones, and diamond coated sharpeners. There are advantages and disadvantages to each.

• Hook files- These really move a lot of metal and are my favorite method o a big hook. Simply lay the file on the side of the hook and follow the lay of the metal. Push towards the point. Do both sides, then a little dress up stroke on the outside. Get one of those plastic file holders and shoot it full of WD-40. Salt water loves to corrode files!

• Hook stones, a bit slower and more delicate than a file, but finer in grit and unaffected by corrosion. Makes for a very fine hook point. Some stones have a small hole on them for a cord to go through. The last ones I bought off of the internet in a medium and ultra fine grit for about \$2.00. They were mounted on a flat piece of 1/8" thick plastic and really worked great. Also good for sharpening your fish knives. Use the same sharpening method on as with the hook file.

• Diamond hones- These come in various grits. The medium grit will move a lot of metal pretty fast, but for the best hook point I prefer a fine grit with a drop of WD-40 on it. Use the same sharpening method as with the hook file. The resulting hook point will be so sharp you'll want to get it out in the water away from you as soon as possible! One day I dropped a K-14 Kwikfish I had just diamond honed in a friend's boat. It fell about 6 inches and one of the hook points stuck in the aluminum of the gunwale. Pulling it out left a perfect little hole where the point had been. Yup, that was a good sharp hook! I re-honed it and sent it on its way. Later a fish came to the same conclusion.

Check your hooks often and make them sharp. You may only get one chance that day. Make it count!

One Last Cast Jim Cathcart (aka Navigator)

Everybody likes to be appreciated. The Sandy River Chapter is blessed in that we have a dedicated cadre of volunteers that carry out the functions of the Chapter. Whether it is supporting the ever popular raffle table at the monthly meetings, planning a clean-up event, running the eggs to fry program,

compiling and editing the newsletter, managing the website, or volunteering at one of the Chapter's Steelhead Fishing 101 workshops — volunteers are the engine that run the Chapter. At the helm are our elected Chapter Board Officers, Steve Rothenbucher, Greg Reed and our Directors. First officer is Beverly Betzer who is the volunteer that coordinates the volunteers and ensures all our hours are reported and counted. This is a thankless job, but every hour reported to the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife brings federal money into Oregon.

Life Member, Larry Palmer, has always appreciated volunteers and has taught me the importance of not taking volunteers for granted. Some of you may have benefited from being selected in one of Larry's volunteer appreciation drawings - where volunteer names are put in a hat based on the number of hours reported and selected for a fishing trip with Larry. I have recast this idea, made it a bit more formal and have gotten Chapter Board approval to implement. It goes something like this. It starts with volunteers reporting their hours using the volunteer reporting form available on the website. The year is divided into 2 six-month periods: October through March and April through September. Twice a year, a drawing is held for a cool volunteer appreciation fishing outing. You get one ticket in the drawing for every 5 hours reported; 1- 5 hours is one ticket, 6-10 hours is two tickets, 11-15 hours is three tickets up to a maximum of five tickets per person. Names are selected and documented at a Chapter Board meeting with alternates selected in case the first chosen are unable to make the event.

<u>NW Steelheader Tillamook Fish-Along. Weekend of Sep. 16.</u> 2017

You will want to block out Friday evening through Sunday on your calendar now! Year after year this is the chapter's most attended fishing event.

Show up Friday evening for dinner and a fishing report and fishing clinic. There will be breakfast Saturday and Sunday morning and a "build your own" lunch bar with lunch meat selections for sandwiches, fruit, a snack, and a beverage. With breakfast in your belly and a lunch bag in your hand, you are ready to head out with your fishing buddies. There will be a BBQ dinner Saturday night followed by tales of the day's exploits and setting up teams for those who want to fish the next day. Sunday morning starts with another hot breakfast. Everyone will need to pack out before leaving for fishing Sunday morning. (The dorm will be cleaned and locked up when everyone leaves. The gate will be left unlocked until late afternoon for the RVs.)

located between the most popular Tillamook Bay boat ramps and is between the Wilson and Trask Rivers. There are also bank fishing opportunities just as close. There is water and 30 amp electrical service for RVs and plenty of parking for boats and other vehicles. It is just south of Highway 6 on Third Street, just off the Wilson River Loop Road. (Turn south off Highway 6 at Wilson River Loop Road. This road ends at the fairground with the two story bunk house to your right.)

<u>Fee Schedule</u> (Fees only cover actual costs of renting the dorm and RV spots and buying food.)

Per individual staying at the dorm or RV: \$80 (no reduction for staying only one of the two nights – we still need to make accommodations)

Per additional family members staying at the dorm: Per additional family members staying in RV (not at

Per individual or family member not staying at the dorm but participating in evening meals and activities: \$30 (does not include breakfast or lunch)

There are a limited number of RV sites with 20 amp electrical, water but no dump are an additional \$10 per night. A few sites with 50 amp are available for \$15 per night.



Those providing seats on their boats are offered a \$20 discount on their total fees as an incentive to bring boats. (Riders are still expected to cover boat gas, ramp fee, bait, etc.)
