Kevin said that the ramp was under the jurisdiction of the Oregon State Marine board. tacted Trey Carsikadon who is a board member and is well known to the ANWS. Trey put me in contact with Wayne Shuyler Assistant Director/Boating facilities program manager for the Oregon State Marine board.

Wayne stated that several steps are required before any work can be done below ordinary high water level. The biggest hurdle will be obtaining a permit for a new ramp. This can take more than a Second they want to make year on waterways with listed species. sure that the new ramp location won't suffer the same fate as the old ramp and silt up, they want a hydrologist to look at the area. Then if these issues can be resolved, the Oregon Marine board and Oregon parks will need to work together for the funding to build a ramp

Jack Glass suggested a temporary solution of digging out the up stream channel between the park and island to divert more water at the existing ramp. This idea didn't get a positive response, because here again you must have permits to dig in the river.

Commercials not happy with allocation for Spring Chinook

Commercial fishermen left a Vancouver, Wash., meeting room Monday embittered about their prospects for harvesting upriver Columbia/Snake spring chinook salmon next year.

The likely scenario is that the gill-net fleet will be allocated 30 percent of the allowed mainstem "impacts" on the upriver run as compared to 70 percent for sport fishers, according to a proposal developed by a panel of Oregon and Washington fish and wildlife commissioners and staff.

If the proposed strategy had been implemented this year, anglers could have hauled in more than 18,000 upriver spring chinook and the gill-netters 3,700 during the period before the run size forecast is updated. The first update is typically produced when fishery officials feel about half of the run has passed Bonneville Dam on their way upstream.

"With this decision I think you're going to put a lot of people out of work," Astoria, Ore.,'s Bruce Buckmaster told the panel.

The 2008 spring mainstem fishing recommendation will now be forwarded to the full Oregon and Washington fish and wildlife commis-

sions. A joint session is planned Dec. 11 to discuss the proposal. Each commission could then adopt the proposal as early as their December meetings.

A new bi-state advisory group was created at summer's end by apportioning of lower Columbia spring and summer chinook salmon harvests between sport and commercial interests. The panel's voting members are three Oregon and three Washington commissioners. Its goal was to develop a joint fishery management


The six commissioners decided that the highest priority in springtime is to give sport fishers a "high probability" of a season that is at least 45 days long, Oregon Commissioner Dan Edge told those gathered in Vancouver.


Non-tribal mainstem sport and commercial fishers are allowed for hatcheries and tributaries above Bonneville Dam, which is located 146 miles from the Columbia's mouth. In recent years the impact limit has been 2 percent. The limits are intended to control impacts on wild Snake River spring/summer and Upper Columbia spring chinook that are listed under the Endangered Species.




Volunteer Hours Needed

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Fall Kokanee Fishing!

After my Wife & Kids had left town to visit family in Southern Oregon I called my Dad & Brother to arrange for some much needed time out on the water.

On the Sunday I met up with my Dad & Brother to fish for

Kokanee in SW Washington. It had been almost a year since my brothers boat had been on the water and he had done some maintenance on the kicker and the engine. Unfortunately, the battery should have been charged for the main engine. So even though I had awoke at 5:30 am to go fishing we had to put the boat back on the trailer and head to town to buy a battery at the local NAPA.

Back to the lake we went. Better late than never we hit the water and motored across the lake. Once there we dropped our offerings of apex lures, wedding rings

and white corn to the desired depth (45-70') and began to troll around. We were almost immediately into fish. The first 10 of our 15 fish limit came to us quickly and we had hopes of being off the water with full limits within another hour. Well it wasn't much after an hour went by and we had limited and we were on our way home. The best part of this trip is that the Kokanee were all between 12-16" in size with the largest weighing around 2.5-3lbs.

While on the boat still, I convinced my Dad that we needed to come again on Monday with my Kids who would be back in town that night. It really didn't take much convincing.

My Wife called me on her way back from Medford as we were heading back to Vancouver to clean our fish and feast on Razor Clams my Dad had brought for us. She asked me if I was going to take the Kids fishing on Monday (apparently they were reading my mind). I said yes I was and that the fishing had been so good I could almost guarantee that they would catch some fish. She assured the boys that while I would be taking them fishing that we would likely catch nothing as that is how fishing works.

In the morning before the Kids awoke I prepared by making hot cocoa, and packing a monster load of snacks. After getting them up and dressed in the clothes my loving wife had prepared for them we headed to the most important stop of the day for any child going fishing, Donut World. All of this preparation would pay off with happy snacking kids if the fishing was slow or Miles (my 5 year old) got bored.

Up to Washington with my boat we went. After launching and heading across the lake we set out the gear and began to troll with the same gear as the day before. Within two hours we had eleven 13-17" fish boated with a larger average than the previous day. My Kids being unable to be quite about our success starting asking every boat we passed how they were doing? In most cases the response was a between

0 and 3 fish. At one point we had two rods go down at the same time after the boys told a fishless boat we had eleven. We only got one to the boat but the other boat was in disbelief. Apparently it was our day to be lucky! My Dad & I had to talk with them to let them know it is not necessarily nice to brag about your success, this can be a hard lesson for a 5 and 10 year old to accept.

Nathaniel had a hard time reeling in the fish but had a good time trying. However, he is an expert at netting fish at this point. Miles had an easier time reeling in my Dad's rod setup with a steelhead rod and a line counter reel with a small trout diver. There

were a few times we had fish hit on the three rods we had out but couldn't manage to get more than two of them in the short time they would stay on. Unfortunately, we had to leave the water before we could catch the last two fish for our limit. We kept losing fish on one of the rods and at the end of the day we realized the problem but it was too late. My Dad had forgotten to place a rubber snubber on his line and the hook kept tearing out of the kokanee's soft mouth.

It was a great day on the water that won't soon be forgotten. I am sure that my boys will remember the trip that allowed them to catch multiple large trout all the while spending the entire day with the Grandfather

The setup for my boat is remarkably similar to Eric Neiwert's. I have a couple of small downriggers weighted with 4lbs cannonballs and two trout casting rods with steelhead reels. My Dad brought his rod with a line counter and I loaned him a trout diver I have had for years.


I think one of the things that made a difference in our catch rate was that I re-tied all of the leaders to have two small Gamakatsu hooks. I found that most of the fish we were able to land had both hooks connected. On my Dad's initial setup he was getting fewer fish to the boat with a single hook, once we changed his lure to my pre-tied setup with two hooks his catch rate went up significantly.

If you plan on trying your luck for Kokanee next summer I would suggest that you get a couple of cheap downriggers for your boat. I noticed that the boats that got the fish mostly had them. Those just trolling lures behind the boat did a lot of trolling and not a lot of catching from my perspective.
