





Old Chapter Newsletter Editors' Reign of Terror Finally Ends



The most important Fishing Technique

Larry asked for success stories and techniques. From Buoy 10 through Tillamook fall fisheries I learned that the most important technique is knowing where the fish will be at the time you want to fish. You can't catch them if they aren't there.

The week spent at Buoy 10 started slow, but the timing of different bites with the tides at the best holes became something that could be predicted by the end of the week with many more hookups. Too bad I never got that figured out at Tillamook this year.

In Tillamook the tides do still play a part but of greater importance is the rains and subsequent river flows. Conventional wisdom says "when the rivers are on the rise and muddy you fish herring in the ghost hole", but I guess the west channel was the place this year. It is good to be in a drift boat as the rivers start dropping into shape. The fish that moved up from the upper bay are starting to settle into the holes but the water is still turbid enough to prevent them from being easily spooked. The first river to clear is the Kilches. Unfortunately it was dropping and in good condition the day before we got there. We caught no chinook. Many of us would still be asking ourselves "what is wrong with my technique?. Fortunately for us, the chum were in to tell us there was nothing wrong with the way we were fishing. Our Kwikfish were well wrapped and swimming irresistibly. We caught and released chum while the guys that figured out the chinook were now holding in tide water were filling their fish box.

But it was still a great day of fishing and catching. Chum are close in size to coho but fight like a chinook of twice the size and they never give up! They fight all the way to the boat, making landing the most difficult part. They also do not require your assistance to recover as much as other salmon species. They are generally ready to go just as soon as you remove the hook. With their gnarly teeth and purple stripes, they make for some great pictures as well.

Timing and location is almost everything if you are fishing for chinook or just get lucky to be there when the chum are in.
