

I General business

One Last Cast

A Periodic Column by Navigator

November is a transition time. For some of you, fishing gives way to hunting. For others, fishing gives way to staying dry and keeping warm. For winter steel headers, Thanksgiving marks the beginning of the season. This is also a time of year to plan for next year. Perhaps you are considering a guided trip. I had an experience where I learned the hard way that not all guides are the same – not in the sense that some are good and others bad – but in the sense that some guides cater to the "non-fisherman" – novices, tourists, and corporate executives -- while others cater to the rest of us – serious diehard fishermen.

I had an opportunity to take an open seat on a guided one day summer steelhead trip on the Clearwater River in Idaho. It was a blind date scenario – where I was hooked up with a serious, passionate fisherman with decades of experience on the Willamette and Clackamas rivers. I will call him Ralph. Ralph had high expectations for the trip – the draw was to fish for legendary upper Columbia basin B-run steelhead. Ralph's expectation for the guide was that for every year Ralph had fished on the Clack, the guide would have two years experience on the Clearwater. The trip had bad "joss" from the beginning. It rained buckets the day we headed out. In denial, we pressed onward – it is the Clearwater, right? Wrong. The river only had that "hint" of color one sees when they don't want to admit the river is blown. (cont. on pg.9)


Cookie List

Sandy River Tackle Swap Page Fly fishing rookie hits the Klickitat (by Jeff Nicol, Hood River, OR)

Duane, my friend from Trout Lake, Washington, has been talking about how we really need to take his Hyde drift boat out on the upper section of the Klickitat. I thought this was a grand idea, but Duane also admitted that he had yet to float that section of the river. Rather than risk life and limb by blindly floating on our own, I agreed to split the cost of a guide so we could learn the river from an expert.

Travis Duddles, owner of <u>The Gorge Fly Shop</u>, suggested we contact Hood River-based guide, <u>Tom Larimer</u>. A few phone calls later and we had booked Tom to hit the Klickitat on October 31st – Halloween – a Monday. We headed up to <u>Stinson Flats</u> to put in for our all-day, 12-mile float. Mostly sunny, light winds and no rain...Who would have expected that forecast late fall fishing in the Gorge?

Tom is a fly-fishing guide and a casting instructor. With Duane already an accomplished single -handed and spey caster, Tom was able to focus the majority of his fly instruction on me. He started out with some brief lessons at the launch site. We only saw one other fisherman, so that stretch of river was almost our exclusive water. After about 15 minutes, I was able to fairly reliably get the fly to the general spot I was shooting for. I've been throwing hardware and trolling for 30+ years, but fly fishing has something I've never really done. The bad news was that I didn't have any fly casting knowledge. The good news was that I didn't have any bad fly casting habits to break!

So we set off in Tom's low-sided Hyde drift boat. We were the only boat in this section of the river, which meant our gear was the first these fish had seen today! The water was clear and a little low, but very "fishy". Coho were periodically rolling and Chinook were thick on the redds. Duane managed a smolt while indicator fishing. I was doing OK, but spent a lot of time with my indicator (bobber) dragging through the water instead of naturally drifting. After a short float, we landed and Tom broke out a spey rod for me to use. I was barely fishing with a single-handed fly rod and now it was time to step up and try a two-handed rod! Under Tom's direction, I was up for the challenge...

We spent most of the morning indicator fishing from the boat with occasional stops to spey cast from shore. The river clearly had a lot of fishable water and there were lots of signs of fish present. If I had packed my spinning gear, I would have been hammering a lot of holes with my favorite Blue Fox! However, I was determined to give the "old college try" to this fly fishing thing! At lunch, I had one hard strike on the spey rod. A quick head-shake and the steelhead was off, but I was now really fired up. As the days are short and the float is long, we had to float by a lot of fishable water to ensure we'd get done before nightfall. This meant more indicator (bobber) fishing with the single-handed fly rods than using spey gear.

I certainly tested the theory that if you're not losing gear, you're not close to the fish! Tom was great about keeping me going and staying positive when I'd snag bottom. Mid-afternoon, I snagged bottom again as we floated downstream at a pretty good clip...Except the "bottom" shook his head and took off up river with my fly in his mouth! I had hooked into a big steelhead!!! I fed out lined pooled at my feet as the boat raced down river. I was attempting to get that line fed out so I could then be on the reel and start using the drag to fight the fish. But, I pulled too hard and snapped the 8# leader. "My" steelhead would live to fight another day.

About an hour later, Duane showed me how it was done as he hooked and landed a 10+ pound



wild buck. It was starting to get dark and made for a great way to end a wonderful float on the upper section of the Klickitat. I'm sure Duane and I will try it again soon in Duane's boat --- but I'm going to sneak some spinner gear in next time to ensure I have my most effective mousetraps at the ready!

November 2, 3 and 4 were the dates of the 27th annual North Coast Salmon Rendezvous, a Tillamook area fund raiser. Chapter member Colonel Thomas paired with Rob McNeilly to form one half of a four person team - all repeat participants. This year 76 anglers joined with 35 guides, who donated their time, to catch 108 Chinook.

On the first day's fishing Colonel and Rob bobber fished the Nestucca River with local guide Doug Miller and hooked over 20 salmon. Rob alone hooked 19 landing 18, while Colonel hooked five landing three. Because only bright fished are allowed (two fish limit, only one can be a native), both anglers searched for bonus hatchery fish (none of the fish were deeply hooked and those released were unharmed - no bleeders). While most of the fishing technique was bobber, Colonel did hook a couple with wrapped Kwik Fish. His bobber fishing skills must be considered a work in progress as he swung late on numerous fish.

During the second day, in the bay, fishing with guide Tom Lines Colonel lost a Chinook early, Rob landed a 26# fish, and the day ended with Colonel hooking one final small Chinook at the jaws. With seven fish totaling 225 inches they still were not in the top three as the winning team turned in 293 inches.

The \$600 fee for this event might seem steep, however the fee includes two breakfasts, two lunches, three dinner and two all day guided trips. It would be nice to see more chapter members involved in this fund raiser next year. In the past, chapter members Norm Ritchie and Bill Beith have not only participated but won or placed numerous times.

Our guide was a youngster that could row a boat and bait a hook; a last minute replacement as our original guide tragically had lost his mother the day before. More bad "joss". We fished high in the basin – on the Middle Fork – which indeed had remained "clear" – and worked the mud line entering from the blown South Fork as we entered the main stem. It was that beautiful – day after the storm – kind of day. The guide worked hard, hadn't forgot the lunches, kept us safe and we stayed on the water more than the minimum. But, his boat was a mess; the rods dirty, tackle worn, lines frayed. Deficiencies real fishermen would notice. So, when you book that trip – clearly indicate to the outfitter that you are an experienced fisherman. Let him or her know your expectations. Ask questions about the outfitter's clientele. If they primarily serve tourists and other "non-fishermen" types -- whose only expectation is to have fun – then chose a different outfitter. Never leave things to chance.
